Co-existing with Wildlife

As gardeners we often strive to create a habitat that will attract and provide a welcoming and sustainable environment for wildlife. Wildlife often finds ways to co-exist with us, and their resilience might surprise us all.

A mother quail selected a flower pot planted with raspberry plants to be her location for a nest. The first sighting of four eggs grew to a final count of twelve eggs over a three week period. The mother quail was observed sitting on the nest off and on for the first three weeks and then more regular the last couple of weeks. She would have been laying more eggs each week and then the last few weeks were when she was incubating the eggs. Upon returning from a vacation, it was discovered that all the eggs had hatched.

Quail chicks are different from most other baby birds. The chicks are able to leave the nest shortly after hatching – typically within twenty four hours. They are quickly able to walk easily and follow their mother, and are able to peck around for food.

Praying Mantis are another adaptive insect. A recent ootheca was found on the handle of an extra, infrequently used plastic trash can. Not your typical object or location one would expect to find an ootheca. The condition of this ootheca shows that the praying mantis had hatched from the nest. Not long after finding the ootheca, which was in June, the first sighting of some juvenile praying mantis were spotted in the garden last week. One was white to blend in with some gravel mulch. The second was green to blend in with the plant life it was on. Praying mantis eggs can be laid in the fall or in the winter. The ootheca is a frothy, styrofoam looking mass created by the female. The froth hardens to form a tough case for the eggs. Hatching usually takes between three and six months.



Snakes are not often a favorite thing to run across no matter where one might be. Garter snakes are beneficial as they eat slugs and rodents. In June, while tending the Pollinator Garden at Garden City, a resident and frequent visitor to the pollinator garden, shared a photo he had taken in the late afternoon, of a few visitors enjoying the garden. The rock sits at the front of one of the planting beds, and is along the walking path between the garden and other property of the City Hall. The rock is beneficial to the garden as it provides protection for the plants and keeps people from walking or riding into the flower bed. This rock catches the rays from the sun for several hours each day. The rock became an area that the three snakes also found beneficial, most likely crawling on the rock to absorb heat it had collected during the day as the evening hours were starting to cool down .

For the past few years, the plum tree in my yard has been attacked by aphids. The aphids like to hide on the underside of the leaves and suck nutrients from the tree. After the first sighting of aphids, one could try to treat them with chemicals, but historically it is only a few days later that ladybugs, ladybug larvae and birds can be seen feeding on the pesky aphids. According to gardenmentors.com the protein in these pest bugs is an important part of many birds' diets.

Native Plants, Backyard Habitats & Pollinators

Native Plants, Backyard Habitat & Pollinators

The December-January 2022 article in the National Wildlife magazine, "Signs of Good Garden Care" by Laura Tangley had some interesting information and some good ideas one might consider for educational opportunities with their own garden.

A property owner in Michigan had neighbors who were unhappy with tall native grasses and leaves left on the ground for the winter months. Everything changed when they put labels with the scientific names in front of the plants. "What was previously perceived as unkempt lawn became a botanical garden."

In Ottawa, Ontario, gardener Berit Erickson also labeled plants. In 2017 after a cedar tree fell to the ground, she converted the lawn into a pollinator garden. More than fifty perennial plant and shrub species, most of the native were planted. Bees, butterflies and even birds never seen before began to show up. "We got nothing but positive feedback from neighbors." People passing by the property were intrigued and they constantly stopped to ask questions. Berit decide; "I wanted to teach them even when I wasn't out working in the yard". She added plant labels and put out a how-to brochure for other gardeners.

Parliamentary Procedure Submitted By Karen Martin

How To Conduct a Meeting - Parliamentary Procedure

Sometimes confusion exists regarding the parliamentary procedure to conduct a garden club meeting. The most common parliamentary authority is Robert's Rules of Order in the United States. Robert's Rules of Order were first published in 1876 and were named for Colonel Henry Martyn Robert, a military engineer in the United States Army. Without warning Mr. Robert was asked to preside over a public meeting being held in a church in his community and realized that he did not know how to conduct a meeting. His attempt to preside over the public meeting led to his embarrassment, and he vowed never to conduct another meeting until he learned more about Parliamentary Law. As he traveled around the county as part of his military duties, he found different members from different parts of the county had differing ideas of correct procedure. In an attempt to bring order to the chaos, he decided to write Roberts Rules of Order. Roberts Rules is the most widely used manual of parliamentary procedures in the United States. It governs the meetings of a diverse range of organizations which include church groups, county commissions, homeowners associations, nonprofit groups, just to name a few, that have adopted it as their parliamentary authority.

The three guiding principles of Roberts Rules of Order are:

1. Everyone should be allowed to speak once before anyone speaks again.

 Everyone has the right to know what is happening, and speakers should only be interrupted in urgent situations.
 Consider only one motion at a time.


The formal steps in handling a motion are the making of a motion, having a second, stating the motion, having debate on the motion, putting the motion to a vote, and announcing the results of the vote. The following link is a guide to conducting a meeting.

When I look back on my years in the garden club, I have met some wonderful and caring people throughout the state of Idaho and throughout the country. Met with newcomers and long-time members that have given a lot of themselves to keep the GCII going through their clubs, District, State, Pacific Region, and National Level. I am thankful for these individuals. A lot of these ladies have since passed on, but they still exist in my memories and most importantly in my heart. I can't just look at a flower and see the beauty of that flower anymore. When I see a chrysanthemum, I see and hear the teachings of Edith Cole. I remember her life story and am amazed by her love, not only of plant life but of human life. I can't think of dirt without hearing my friend Lorna Inglet in my head saying, *"it's soil not dirt", soil is what you put seeds and plants in to nourish them and let them grow, dirt is the unwanted trash left behind*!

My life in my local garden club began in 2006. I attended a few club meetings and soon was elected president of the club. I served for a number of terms of office as president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer for my club. I also served as 2nd vice director for the Clearwater District.

During my time as president of the Nezperce Garden Club I implemented programs that helped the club win State, Pacific Region and National level awards. I started the Garden Club Calendar that won at National three times, Good Neighbor Award, Scholarship Fund, Facebook Page as well as a Website for the club. Published a club newsletter entitled *The Cheerful Gardener*, published ten club yearbooks in which I scheduled guest speakers for every month, created a video promoting Flower Show School that won an award at national level, helped to start the very first junior garden club in the state of Idaho called the *Rose Buds Junior Garden Club*. I've made hundreds of Christmas wreaths throughout the years. I also worked with my friend and club member Kathy Camden to have a Blue Star Memorial dedicated to the veterans in Nezperce. Unfortunately, as you leave your appointed office the programs that you implemented aren't always kept up.

The greatest honors that I have received while in my time in garden club were being presented the *GCII 2011 Woman of the Year Award* by former state President Robyn McCarthy. Also when club member Lorna Inglet *presented me with a butterfly wind chime from the Rose Buds Garden Junior Garden Club and the Nezperce Garden Club for my service to both clubs.*

Other things that I have accomplished during my years in Nezperce: I volunteered to help run a farmers market for a number of years. Most importantly for our environment and for our world, I had dreams of Nezperce having its own recycling center in town, so I spoke to Mayor Steve Bateman and struck up a deal with him. If I agreed to teach the people of Nezperce how to recycle and show that there was an interest in the community, the town would take on the responsibilities after I established a recycling program. Club members along with myself started going into the local school to teach the children good recycling habits. So I started a temporary recycling center by collecting recyclable items in my garage for twenty nine months, until the town had established a permanent collection site in 2013.

I also ran the local food bank in town for eight years, first as the Nezperce Food Pantry and then as The Corner Cupboard.

My greatest honor as a citizen of the town of Nezperce was when Mayor Steve Bateman presented me with a plaque naming me *Volunteer of the year in 2016.*
